

Ph.D PROGRAMME

The PhD programme is designed to equip the students with advanced skills of learning and analysis involving knowledge of appropriate methods and modes of inquiry, including statistical and interpretative techniques to systematically approach the study of political problems. The research students undergo a semester long rigorous coursework which includes a core paper on Research Methodology and two Optional Papers from diverse themes. Students periodically present their research in the annual 'Work-in-Progress' workshops, which is an integral part of their thesis writing. The programme provides an opportunity to students to undertake detailed research in preparation for a career in academia.

RESEARCH Networks:

One of the unique features of the Department is its research networks. Global Justice Research Group



SOCIAL AND COMMUNITY OUTREACH

Committed to contributing towards betterment of the society, the Department encourages all students to be part of the social service sector. As a first initiate-of-its kind, the Department has, in collaboration with Institute of Development Studies (IDS), Sussex and Water Supply and Sanitation Collaborative Council, a UN organization, organized an innovative Village Immersion Program to contribute towards Swachh Bharat Abhiyan (Gramin) involving about sixty Masters students. The program focused on research methods specially the Reality Check Approach and Participatory Research Appraisal to study about 30-40 open defecation free villages in about 12 states during summer 2018.



Community outreach programs are vital for fostering social responsibility and connecting academic institutions with local communities. The Department conducts programs to promote mental well-being, personal growth, and resilience, especially during challenging times like the pandemic. Sessions on mindfulness, mental health, and holistic wellness, the department supports individual development but strengthens community ties. Programs like these highlight the importance of collective healing and shared experiences.
